## Outline

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Overview of Transplant

Organ transplantation is defined as “the moving of an organ from one body to another” or from donor to recipient in order to replace a malfunctioning organ in the recipient [reference - giftdonor.org]. Many organs can be transplanted and the most common include heart, lungs, kidneys, pancreas, intestines, and liver. Tissues that can be transplanted include skin, bones, tendons, cornea, heart valves, and veins. Donors may be living or deceased, and deceased donors can be pronounced by either brain or cardiac death. Living donors can be relatives, friends, co-workers or even strangers. Deceased donors pronounced by brain death may be organ donors as breathing and blood perfusion are maintained via artificial sources until the time of donation. Lastly, deceased donors pronounced by cardiac death may be organ donors if organs are procured within hours of cessation of the heartbeat or when blood perfusion occurs artificially until organs may be harvested.

To be an organ donor, it is important to make your wishes known to your family members. Most states allow you to indicate your wishes when applying for or renewing your driver’s license. Some states even have a denotation on the license. Regardless of this, it is still important to let your family know your wishes as well.

If donation becomes an option for you or a family member, the donated organs will be matched to the best recipient on the transplant list. The definition of “best” varies by organ. In kidney transplantation, for example, it is generally given to the recipient who has a compatible blood type and who has been on dialysis the longest. In liver transplantation, it is generally given to the recipient who has a compatible blood type and who is the most sick or most in need of a transplant.

Remember: to the world you may be just one person, but to one person, you may be the world. Your gift of organ donation may be the difference between life and death for several people with a failing organ.

### **Why Donation is Important**

Currently, there are over 109 THOUSAND people waiting for a life-saving organ. Every day, approximately 100 organ transplants occur BUT approximately 17 people die waiting for an organ. Living donors most commonly donate kidneys; some donate livers. Every deceased donor can save up to EIGHT lives by donating their organs [reference - organdonor.gov]

### **The Organ Donation Challenge**

The American Society of Transplantation (AST) Transplant Pharmacy Community of Practice (TxPharm CoP) supports an annual event called “The Organ Donation Challenge”. The Challenge relies on collaboration with pharmacy schools and student chapters of pharmacy professional organizations. You are challenged to design and conduct at least one organ donation event. Events and activities typically occur during April, national Donate Life month, but events and activities may occur at any time.

We encourage you to create a transplant/organ donation interest group and work together with a local transplant pharmacist and/or a representative from your local organ procurement organization (see Appendix A). An organ procurement organization (OPO) is a local organization that is responsible for educating their service area regarding organ donation, facilitating donor registration, and coordinating the donation process for deceased organ donors. OPOs evaluate potential donors, discuss organ donation with surviving family members, and arrange for the surgical removal and transport of donated organs. To facilitate donor registration, OPOs implement community outreach strategies to encourage people to sign up in their state donor registry.

Sample events include canvassing your school with flyers or information relating to organ donation, adding a donor tag to your email signature, hosting an organ donation booth at a local health fair, or helping students on campus understand organ donation and register their wish to be an organ donor. It could include inviting someone from the local OPO, a transplant recipient, a living donor, and/or a family member of a deceased donor as a guest speaker. It could involve organizing a continuing education talk or symposium about organ donation. Perhaps arrange a ceremony where you plant trees, bushes or flowers or even have pharmacy students become trained advocates of your regional organ procurement organization. Your creativity is the only limit!

### **Awards**

The Organ Donation Workgroup offers prizes in four categories:

**1. The Best Overall Project**

Awarded to the group who receives the overall highest score. The winner of this category will be featured at the 2019 American Transplant Congress and the winning school will receive an engraved plaque in recognition of their efforts. A monetary prize of \$250 is sponsored by Veloxis Pharmaceuticals is awarded to the Best Overall Project.

**2. Best New Project**

Awarded to a school who has not previously submitted a project to the Organ Donation Challenge. The new school with the best new project will be awarded a monetary prize of \$250 sponsored by Veloxis Pharmaceuticals.

**3. Most Sustainable Project**

Awarded to a school whose efforts are most likely to be continued on an annual basis. The school will provide justification on how their events are likely to be sustained. The most sustainable project will be awarded a monetary prize of \$250 sponsored by Veloxis Pharmaceuticals.

#### 4. Best Resident Project.

Awarded to the top scoring application with significant resident involvement. In order to apply, the resident who participated will provide an overview of their involvement and submit their letter to Anne Kreiss (akreiss@myast.org), Kayla Joyal (kayla.f.joyal@lahey.org), Emily Sartain (Emily.sartain@uchealth.org), and their AST Champion via email. The best resident project will be awarded a \$250 monetary prize sponsored by Veloxis Pharmaceuticals.

#### Applicants must:

- Have a collaborator who is a current member of AST
- Have a collaborator who is a current member of the AST Transplant Pharmacy CoP
- Submit a two-page, typed summary of activities in paragraph form submitted via email to Kayla Joyal at [kayla.f.joyal@lahey.org](mailto:kayla.f.joyal@lahey.org) and Emily Sartain at [Emily.sartain@uchealth.org](mailto:Emily.sartain@uchealth.org)
- The Best Overall, Best New Project, and Most Sustainable Project require one application
- The Best Resident Project requires an additional one-page typed summary of activities performed by the resident as well as a letter of confirmation of the resident's involvement from the school's AST Champion

The submission deadline for the 2020-2021 school year is **Friday, May 14, 2021 at 11:59pm PST**. Pictures of events and activities are highly encouraged!

The following criteria will be used in choosing the winner of the Best Overall Project and Best New Project:

- Creativity
  - Part 1- individuality (0-10 points)
  - Part 2- sustainability (0-2 points)
- Impact
  - Part 1 – size and outreach (0-10 points)
  - Part 2- community effect (1-20 points)
- Execution
  - Multidisciplinary Involvement (0-3 points)
  - Project Coordination (1-15 points)
- Overall impression (1-10 points)

The following criteria will be used in choosing the winner of the **Most Sustainable Project:**

- Mention of intent to continue project on an interval basis (0-3 points)
- Explain how this project or a part of this project can be sustained (0-4 points)
- Significance of continuing project on a regular basis (1-4 points)
- Community impact (0-4 points)

The following criteria will be used in choosing the winners of the **Best Resident Project:**

- Idea development (1-15 points)
- Leadership (1-20 points)
- Supporting letter from the school's AST Champion confirming the resident's involvement in the project (REQUIRED- no points)

All submissions are evaluated by a panel of three impartial judges selected by the AST Transplant Pharmacy CoP Organ Donation Workgroup. Judges will not be eligible for the award and will consider both qualitative and quantitative factors when scoring the projects. The winner will be announced at the American Transplant Congress.

### **Appendix C: Example Organ Donation Projects**

#### **UCSD 2018-19 Project Submission**

Student Champions: Annie Bui and Katherine Wu

AST Champion: Shirley Tsunoda, PharmD

During the 2018-2019 academic year, 8 students at the UCSD Skaggs School of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences (SSPPS) formed an Organ Donation Awareness Committee. One of our goals was to provide education to high school youth through clinical presentations in

collaboration with Lifesharing, the local San Diego Organ Procurement Organization. In the process, pharmacy students, medical students, undergraduates, transplant recipients, and health professionals from the UCSD Health system joined our efforts to outreach to thousands of additional individuals. It has been such a successful year and we're eager to share it with you in the paragraphs to follow.

#### Clinical High School Presentations

**San Ysidro High School:** On February 22nd, 2019, we visited 3 classes at San Ysidro High School to deliver interactive presentations to a total of 74 students. The presentations were embedded with true or false questions to debunk popular myths about organ donation and overviewed the organ procurement process. We also invited lung and liver recipients from Lifesharing to share their stories. The stories from the recipients combined with the new knowledge from the presentations were powerful in changing the students' perceptions about organ donation.

**Torrey Pines High School:** On May 6th and 7th, 2019, we visited an Anatomy and Physiology class at Torrey Pines High School to educate 60 students on organ donation. We started the presentation with some shocking statistics about the number people waiting for transplants, and in contrast, the number of lives that can be saved by each organ/tissue donor. We then dissected down the presentation into different organs to go over their functions and the common causes of certain organ failures. At the very end, a double lung recipient shared a story about how her life drastically changed through the gift of donation in hopes to inspire the students to register as donors.

In the upcoming weeks, we are excited to deliver 3 more clinical presentations at Santana High School and Francis Parker High School. We anticipate reaching an additional 60 students.

**Pharmacy Day:** On February 16th, 2019, UCSD SSPPS hosted the annual Pharmacy Day to introduce over 150 students from 7 high schools throughout San Diego County to the profession of pharmacy. After the students attended a number of specialty workshops, they reconvened in the main auditorium where two of our committee members dispelled common organ donation myths and delved into the role of pharmacists in organ transplant. The presentation concluded with an inspiring story from a liver transplant recipient who spoke about how organ donation transformed his life, enabling him to coach football and raise his two young sons.

In honor of National Donate Life Month, the majority of our events took place in April, beginning with our 2nd annual Organ Donation Awareness Week. We publicized our activities extensively in the weeks leading up to Awareness Week through email listservs, Facebook group posts, physical flyers posted on the campus bulletin board, and announcements to individual classes.

**Wear Green Ribbon Day:** The Green Ribbon symbolizes the act of giving hope and sharing life through organ/tissue donation. Therefore, on our first day of Awareness Week, we invited 193 pharmacy students from years 1-3 to wear green ribbons inscribed with the words "DONATE LIFE." Walking around with the green ribbons represented our support of organ donation and aimed to catch the public's attention to inspire more people to join our cause.

**Pink Wall Installation:** Our biggest project during Awareness Week was the Pink Wall Installation, made possible by the generous grant from the AST Pharmacy COP Organ Donation Workgroup. Our vision was to create an interactive piece that not only engaged people who were already

donors, but also encouraged others to register or at least think about donation. As a nod to the donor dots on driver's licenses, we printed pink dot cutouts that read "My name is \_\_\_\_\_ & I am a DONOR" to invite passersby to add their names in hopes of filling a large 8 ft x 8 ft backdrop board titled "Be a Hero. Donate Life!"

The Pink Wall was on display for 3 days. On the first day, we left the wall in the UCSD health sciences lobby to encourage participation among medical and pharmacy students. For the remaining two days, we placed the Pink Wall on Library Walk at the heart of the UCSD main campus to capture the attention of 28,127 undergraduates. The display on Library Walk was coupled with tabling sessions to provide informational handouts and registration cards. Transplant recipients and volunteers from Lifesharing were also present to share their stories and support the cause.

The response to the Pink Wall was incredible. We collected a total of 151 pink dots and registered 9 new donors! Our social media presence also exploded as a result of this project. In addition to the posts from people who interacted with the wall, we received recognition from the UCSD School of Medicine (SOM), UCSD School of Pharmacy (SOP), CSHP-UCSD Student Chapter, and Lifesharing San Diego across all three major social media platforms (Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter). The combined followers base from these accounts enabled us to expand our reach to over 5,800 online users.

Shadow a Transplant Pharmacist: For 3 consecutive days, 6 pharmacy students took part in 1-hour shadowing sessions with transplant pharmacists Dr. Jade Kozuch and Dr. Mark Mariski in their clinical practice. It was an eye-opening opportunity to witness the lives of both transplant pharmacists and recipients. The role of pharmacists is crucial in transplant since most patients battle rejection and require 10-20 medications to control their symptoms. Seeing the process of transplant, the recovery of the patients, and the post-transplant care after discharge made us appreciate organ donation all the more and encouraged us to continue our efforts in spreading awareness.

Organ Donation Symposium: We ended Awareness Week with the Organ Donation Symposium, an annual joint event held between the UCSD Skaggs School of Pharmacy and School of Medicine. This year, we had around 70 attendees. Our guest speakers included pulmonologist Dr. Kamyar Afshar who touched on lung diseases and the human aspect of transplant, transplant pharmacist Dr. Mark Mariski who eloquently described his diverse roles through a patient case study, and lung transplant recipient John McNamara who humorously shared his story and expressed his gratefulness for a "second chance at life." Their personal stories not only stressed the importance of organ donation, but also demonstrated how the topic closely intertwined with our medical careers.

Moving forward, we intend to continue celebrating Organ Donation Awareness Week every month of April. Beyond maintaining the activities we set forth this year, our hope is to expand the Pink Wall Installation. We plan to do so by leaving the Pink Wall in the main campus lobby for a longer period of time to allow for not only students, but also faculty and visitors to contribute to the piece throughout the month. The Pink Wall would achieve a higher impact with its repeated presence as it would initiate discussion about organ donation among more groups of people. Hopefully, the more discussion there is about this sensitive topic, the more people are encouraged to participate and add their pink dots to fill up the wall. Lifesharing also expressed an interest in replicating our project on a larger scale. So potentially, with the funding and support from such a large organization, we can expand our reach beyond the UCSD community to the San Diego County population.

Triton Day: On April 13th, 2019, Triton Day was held to welcome about 25,000 newly admitted undergraduates and their families to the UCSD campus. In collaboration with CSHP, we held a booth alongside other student organizations to raise awareness about organ donation and the dangers of tobacco smoke. Our contribution involved an “Organ Match Game” that required students to match organ printouts to the correct locations on a body cutout. This prompted a conversation about how many lives each organ donor can save, followed by true/false questions related to common organ donation myths. As an incentive, all students who participated got the chance to spin a wheel to win a prize.

In conclusion, our committee has had a very rewarding year. Not only were we able to continue some successful events from previous years, but also to carry out our unique Pink Wall project which reached over 30,000 people. We’ll also have provided educational presentations to approximately 200 high school students who will all hopefully be inspired to get pink dots on their own driver’s licenses when the time comes. These achievements were truly fulfilling and serve as a motivation for us to continue raising awareness, to “Be a Hero & Donate Life!”

#### **University of Mississippi 2018-19 Organ Donation Awareness Challenge Submission**

For the first time, students and residents from the University of Mississippi participated in the Organ Donation Awareness Challenge set forth by the American Society of Transplantation. A group of 20 students from the various health professions schools at the University of Mississippi Medical Center including pharmacy, medical, dental, nursing, and health professions and 5 pharmacy residents from the University of Mississippi Medical Center came together to make our Organ Donation events possible. The Mississippi Organ Recovery Agency (MORA) and University Transplant at the University of Mississippi Medical Center were consulted to help brainstorm ideas and make these events come to life. The following is a description of the events that were organized and held during the month of April promoting organ donation.

**Organ Donation Tables:** April 8-12<sup>th</sup> from 11:00 to 1:00 tables were displayed at two places within the University of Mississippi Medical Center. These tables displayed information about organ donation focusing primarily on the myths and misconceptions about organ donation. MORA representatives and volunteers were there to answer any questions and promote organ donation. These MORA representatives were also readily available to register those who wished to become organ donors. During this week, 24 people registered to become organ donors and countless others began thinking about organ donation. T-shirts with the Donate Life logo were also sold at these tables with proceeds all proceeds going to MORA.

**Donate Life Unit Decorations:** Different departments around the hospital and nursing units were encouraged to decorate their respective areas with a Donate Life theme. Several different units and areas participated in this event. The transplant department had the most unique and proud display.

**Legacy Day:** A representative from our committee participated in planning for the hospital’s annual Legacy Day which honors donors and recipients and their families. At this event, a donor’s family, recipient, and transplant surgeon spoke about their experiences with organ

donation. Organ donor names from this previous year were read aloud with a moment of silence to remember not only our donors but all donors. There was also a balloon release in remembrance of our donors and to celebrate the gift of life. Around 100 people participated in this event which took place on April 12<sup>th</sup>. We also encouraged everyone at the hospital to wear green and blue or their Donate Life t-shirts to celebrate National Blue and Green Day.

**Organ Donation Trivia Night:** On April 16<sup>th</sup>, we hosted a trivia night at a local bar and restaurant to raise awareness and promote organ donation. There was one category dedicated to facts about organ and tissue donation. Around 90 people participated in this trivia night. We raised \$415 which was donated to MORA's public education fund.

### **University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC) College of Pharmacy 2018-19 Organ Donation Awareness Challenge Submission**

Students of PMPR 347 Advanced Transplant Therapeutics

For this year's Organ Donation Awareness Challenge, pharmacy students of the Spring 2019 Transplant elective class orchestrated a multi-site demonstration advocating awareness of the field of transplant, the ongoing organ shortage, and ease of registration for the organ donor registry. In our proposal, we highlighted our intent to host two interactive 'hubs' in the lobbies of UIC COP and Student Center West - at which we would have educational posters, brochures, and access to laptops for individuals to sign up to become organ donors. To further incentivize individuals to sign up to become an organ donor, we proposed to have pins, stress balls, and edible organ transplant gummies for those who completed our brief five-question ice breaker quiz. All parts of the proposal were carried out at both sites across two days - April 24<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup>.

As organ transplantation requires extensive interdisciplinary collaboration, one of our main goals within this campaign was to target an interdisciplinary audience. Student Center West is a common meeting center for all students and faculty from the various professional schools. There are many curriculums and schools who might not have any class on transplant and organ donation such as dental, nursing, or occupational therapy, among others. These students might not even think about this subject because they don't encounter it. Through our presence at Student Center West, 5-10 total sign ups were attained over the course of a two day period. At UIC College of Pharmacy, we also had about 5-10 total sign ups. We believe bringing awareness to other professions can help bring awareness to the importance of signing up for organ donation and help recognize the impact one single person could have on someone's life.

It was interesting to see the spectrum of knowledge that different healthcare professionals had on transplantation. We talked to about 20-30 people at both Student Center West and UIC College of Pharmacy lobby through our two day campaign. Some were well versed and already had strong opinions formulated on the matter, while others were not - which allowed us to educate them on the benefits and needs of transplantation in the healthcare settings. Organ donation is not a common topic unless it personally affects you or you work in the field of transplant. We think a lot of misconceptions are out there - including not a full understanding of what organ donation is, how you can help, and what impact you can have in terms of lives saved. The presence of these misconceptions was proven true as through our various interactions we

noted a common reason that many were opposed to transplantation was simply because they could not bear the idea of their own organs being taken from them. We felt that despite many polarized opinions, the booth generated an opportunity for opinions to be shared and the general views of UIC health professionals to be realized. This is a great first step as educating healthcare providers and getting them to consider transplantation as an option, not only for themselves, but to their patients. Consequently, this can potentially generate more willing donors and eventually aid in reducing organ shortages.

We spoke to a few people whose interest was caught by our poster. Many of the people were unaware of some of the facts that we had on our board. When people were told that one donor could save up to eight lives, they were amazed. Some people already wanted to register as organ donors and used this opportunity to do so. However, others were interested in learning more about the organ donation process. People who came to our poster were really grateful for the information that they learned; some of them even decided to register to be an organ donor on the spot. We were able to collect signatures on the poster boards from people who were already organ donors, as well as people who decided to become organ donors on the spot.

We believe that establishing a regular presence for years to come, whether through the same individuals or other students to come, within the UIC Campus and the Illinois Medical District can allow word to be spread among individuals of other professions and allow easy access for them to be informed about transplantation, as well as be given opportunity to sign up as a donor!

The course coordinators of PMPR 347 Advanced Transplant Therapeutics are also AST Transplant Pharmacy Community of Practice Members and will continue to have students of the class participate in the Organ Donation Awareness Challenge on an annual basis with projects such as the one described above. These annual student projects have caught the attention of the local organ procurement agency Gift of Hope who has graciously extended their support by providing informative materials on organ donation for students to distribute. We plan to continue considering the impact of these events and will consider a greater number of days with interactive “hubs” next year in order to reach more people. We also will plan to diversify the locations, such as the dialysis center on campus or hospital lobby, in order to reach different people. The pharmacy students of this UIC transplant elective course have sustainably submitted to the organ donation awareness challenge on an annual basis since 2013 and we strive to annually increase the impact of our efforts in increasing organ donation awareness in our world.
